RESEARCH PLANS AND RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

Ongoing research covers four main themes. In the first, Anirudh Krishna (Duke University), Kunal Sen (UNU WIDER) and I take a fresh look at social mobility in developing countries. A joint paper was published in 2017, (item 6 on above list) while a review article has been accepted and will appear in the World Bank Research Observer soon (item 2 on above list). We are also editing a book titled ‘Social mobility in developing countries: concepts, methods and determinants’ for UNU WIDER, Helsinki, which will be published in 2020: a number of leading international scholars have agreed to contribute.

The second is a follow up and deepening of my own research on the dynamics of women’s political leadership (item 6 on above list): this is joint work with Ananish Chaudhuri (University of Auckland), Francesca Refsum Jensenius (University of Oslo) and Pushkar Maitra (Monash University). The overarching research question is whether and if so how political exposure – through time in office - affects female and male politicians.

Theme three – with Richard Palmer-Jones (University of East Anglia) and Kunal Sen (UNU WIDER) - is funded by the Future Dams consortium at University of Manchester: our work will revisit and expand on existing research on the agricultural productivity, poverty, health and other well-being impacts of large dams in India and elsewhere.

Theme four – with Bidisha Barooah (3ie), Adrienne Martin (NRI), Purnima Menon (IFPRI), Pooja Sengupta (3ie) and Amanda Wendt (University of Heidelberg) is a large scale and rigorous impact evaluation of a WorldFish project attempting to bolster productivity, nutrition and women’s participation in aquaculture in Rajshahi and Rangpur divisions in Bangladesh.
