Research question: Are countries with high political inequality most unstable?

What is political inequality?

Equal opportunities (access to political decisions)

and

Equal outcomes (weight in influence over political decisions)

How to measure political inequality?

Political inequality = Level of democratization

- + Political participation
- + Political rights
- + Civil liberties

METHODS

Panel: 68 developing countries

Period: 2006-2012

Regression analysis: Panel Logit

Data:

1/ Political inequality :

Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU) Democracy Index

2/ Political instability :

i/ Major Episodes of Political Violence (MEPV, CSP Group)


ii/ Number of coup d'état (CSP Group)

3/ Control variables (GDP, Inflation, Urban pop, Population density...)

Political inequality according to EIU index

Average of 5 categories:

- ightarrow electoral process and pluralism
- ightarrow civil liberties
- ightarrow functioning of government
- \rightarrow political participation
- \rightarrow political culture






Figure 2. Coups d'état by region, 1962-2012




Figure 3. The EIU's Democracy Index map, 2012
